INFINITY LEADERS ADVOCATE AGAINST PLAN B CHANGES

Some industry advocates warn that more Part B pain could be coming.

Notably, there is an 8% proposed cut in physical therapy rates in the final [Physician Fee Schedule \(PFS\)](#), slated for 2021. JoLynn Munro, Division President, and Michelle Jabczynski, Director of Compliance and Strategy, recently traveled to Washington, D.C. to advocate for the removal of this cut.

PDPM IS RUNNING ABOVE BUDGET-NEUTRAL, BUT CLAWBACKS AREN'T INEVITABLE

Early analyses of the new Medicare payment model for nursing homes indicate that operators may be pulling in more money than the federal government intended, leading to widespread speculation that adjustments could be coming sometime in 2020.



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
